


The Instituto Lux, through the Pedro José Márquez S.J. Library, invites you to participate in the

Tales for Peace 2026 initiative

To participate, you must be a student, teacher, or staff member of a Jesuit school anywhere in the world.

You can participate with a short story, poem, or essay written in Spanish, English, or French, in the following categories:



Submitted texts must be original works; texts written using AI computer-generated text will not be accepted.

You can submit your texts from Monday, December 8, 2025, until Monday, April 27, 2026.

Selection:

- Submissions will be evaluated considering the grade level or age of the authors. The selection of texts will be carried out by a committee for each category.
- The jury will be composed of teachers, parents, students, and alumni from the Jesuit educational community. In addition, the selected texts will be reviewed using applications that determine if they have been created with AI or plagiarized.
- The selected authors will be recognized, and their work will be published in the thirteenth digital anthology, "Tales for Peace 2026 #GiveWhatIAm"
- Our goal is to foster a love of writing and to share the texts created; therefore, there will be no prizes.

To participate:

Step 1. Get inspired

We are all on a continuous journey that is life. To travel it, we need a backpack in which to store lessons learned, mistakes, successes, tools, and also the teachings of the people who accompany us: our family, our friends, teachers, and especially God. All these elements help us to actively participate in the well-being of others.

Young people like Francisco Vera, a climate change activist from Colombia, and Artemisa Xakriabá, a Brazilian indigenous human rights activist who defends the Amazon rainforest and tries to raise awareness of environmental destruction in her country, are a source of inspiration. Despite the situations they face every day, they carry in their backpacks actions that reflect their love and interest in helping others and our common home. They are definitely not the only ones who care for the well-being of others, and we can find examples of care all around us, even in nature, like opossums, which silently help us control pests; in addition to caring for and protecting their young by carrying them on their backs until they need them.

Step 2. Reflect

It's time to review and acknowledge the items you carry in your backpack. The following questions can guide you in the process:

- What does your backpack contain?
- Who helped you pack your backpack?
- What tools do you carry to get through the journey?
- · What lessons and moments does your backpack hold?
- What items would you change in your backpack?

Once you have reflected on the questions, it's time to identify the actions you take where you prioritize the well-being of others, in the following situations:

- · in interpersonal relationships (friendships, sports teams, work teams, family) and
- · in caring for our common home.

Step 3. Create

Choose one of the identified actions and let your imagination run wild to share your answer to the following question:

How do you use what you carry in your backpack to serve others?

Remember that you can write a short story, poem, or essay.



Step 4. Review the structure of your text.

Depending on the type of text you have chosen, check that it meets the following requirements:

V

SHORT STORY

- It must have a title.
- It must have an introduction, rising action, and resolution.
- The elements of the story (characters, time, actions, and setting) must be developed clearly and creatively.
- The length should be a maximum of two pages, or a maximum of one thousand words in total.

ESSAY

(for Middle and High School Students)

- Give it a title.
- Ensure your thesis and opinion are clearly stated.
- The essay should be no longer than two pages, or a maximum of 1,000 words in total.

POEM

- It must have a title.
- You can develop your poem freely in terms of rhyme, stanzas, and meter.
- The length should be between 5 and 20 lines.



Step 5. Format your text

Transfer your text to a word processor and ensure it has the following formatting:

- · Arial font, 12 pt. size;
- 1.5 line spacing;
- · Remember to use correct spelling.
- · PDF format

Step 6. Submit your text
